- Intern with organizations that focus on a sociological issue, such as health, economic development, or social justice.






Why Study Sociology?

Sociology majors develop the critical thinking skills necessary to better understand our globally connected and diverse world and learn research methods and communication skills that are in demand by employers.


National Survey of Skills Desired by Employers
